

We have also been over to forest school to find the rocket that had crash landed!












EYU!

We are a mixture of goats and horses across year 3, and we loved hearing about what this meant about us!










Year 4 have really enjoyed getting stuck into their Survival topic this week!

<u>Drum Assembly</u> <u>and Lessons</u>








Key Stage 2 and Year 2 had an incredible assembly by Dan Guest! He is a professional drummer and a private drum tutor!

Keeping our children safe online









Live streaming has become a popular feature of many apps and platforms. By understanding why it is popular and what your child may come across, parents and carers can help children have a more positive online experience. All of the above platforms have a recommended age of use of 13. However we want to inform you so you can make better decisions of what content your child has access to.

There are several factors that can make watching or creating live streams potentially harmful for children and young people including:

Content: If they're watching other people's live streams, children could be exposed to age-inappropriate content, including sexual or violent content.

Offensive comments: If a young person's live stream is open to the public, viewers may be able to leave negative or inappropriate comments on feeds.

Inappropriate contact: There can be hundreds, potentially thousands, of people watching a live stream, including people who might be looking to hurt or exploit children and young people.

The Child Exploitation and Online Protection Centre (CEOP) has published a short guide with practical steps and conversation starters to help children stay safer while live streaming.
